

TRANSFER STUDENT GUIDELINES ACADEMIC YEAR 2022-2023 Updated July 8, 2022

ORU accepts liberal arts courses from CHEA recognized accredited institutions as well as courses from schools accredited by the International Christian Accrediting Association (ICAA), the Association for Biblical Higher Education (ABHE), the Association of Theological Schools (ATS), and the Oklahoma Regents for Higher Education. Academic Council on Education (ACE) recommendations are used for evaluating Military and some online platform courses for credit. All other courses must be petitioned and approved by the appropriate academic department chair before acceptance is granted.

Transfer credit is awarded provided a grade of "C" or higher is achieved. Courses listed in the following guidelines are transferrable without petition unless otherwise noted. There is also the Transfer Equivalency Self-Service tool should your institution be mapped specifically for transfer credit.

No credit will be awarded for courses designated with "Pass/No Pass", "Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory" grading scale or remedial/developmental level course work.

* If a transfer course is from a two-year institution and has the same title as an ORU upper division course, it will be sent to the Business Department Chair and Dean for review. Any upper division (300 level or higher) course from a four-year institution that has the same course title as an ORU course will be transferred based on the equivalent ORU course title.

Strategic Management, Marketing Management, Senior Seminar and Senior Paper must be taken exclusively at ORU.
